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Celebrating 30 Years of Alleviating Hunger & Nourishing Stronger Communities

The Eastern Illinois Foodbank celebrated its official 30th birthday on May 3 this year! We wanted to take this opportunity to take a look back at where EIF came from and share with you our goals for the future.

The Eastern Illinois Foodbank was formed as part of a major regional effort to develop an emergency food network in central Illinois. In 1980, a group of about 20 local citizens met in Springfield to form a food distribution network that eventually became three independently-run foodbanks: Central Illinois Foodbank in Springfield, Peoria Area Foodbank, and Eastern Illinois Foodbank.

In June of 1983, the Eastern Illinois Foodbank opened its doors in downtown Champaign, in the building formerly occupied by Sears. During its first year, the new EIF warehouse distributed about 30,000 pounds of food. Initially, just a few food donors gave nearly all the product that the Foodbank distributed—and there was very little community-wide effort to help the fledgling organization stock its shelves.

In the past thirty years, the Foodbank has garnered tremendous support from our community. So much so,

that almost 54% of our funding comes from individual donors, corporations and events. Without our supporters the Foodbank wouldn't have been able to reach heights only hoped for by EIF's founders, including:

- *Distributing 7 million pounds of food (FY13) - 1 million pounds of which was fresh produce*
- *Developing four ancillary programs – School Pantry Program, Backpack Program, Foodmobile Program, and the Dinner Ready Program – to reach unmet need*
- *Implementation of the SNAP Outreach Program - which create \$3,365,453 of economic impact in eastern Illinois*
- *Creating a volunteer program 1,400 volunteers strong!*

Those are just a few highlights from the past thirty years. We have ambitious goals for the future including, providing more nutritious food to our neighbors in need and implementing the groundbreaking College Pantry Program, as well as creating an effort addressing senior hunger.



How many people are struggling with hunger in our community?

What is our impact on hunger and food insecurity?

Our team of dedicated volunteers will be on the road this summer across our 14-county region collecting this data. We'll use this new information (*to be*

released in 2014), along with all the other metrics we monitor, to develop and adjust our programs, to track our impact, and to paint a more sophisticated picture of the work that lay ahead. It will bolster our resolve, tighten our focus, and make us more efficient and effective.

Construction Update

The Eastern Illinois Foodbank just completed an expansion of our refrigeration and freezer capacity to increase our ability to safely store nutritious food (such as produce, dairy, perishable fruits and vegetables, grains, and meat) by 60%. The Foodbank now has over 9,000 sq. ft. of cold storage space that will significantly impact our core work to fight hunger in eastern Illinois by supporting the acquisition and distribution of more nutritious and fresh food to children and families as part of our **Healthy Futures Initiative**.

Advocacy Alert

The debate over the 2013 Farm Bill is heating up in Congress and we need your help! SNAP benefits are at risk of being cut by \$21 billion. The proposed cuts are equal to \$20-25 for a family of 3, which will result in devastating consequences for our hungry neighbors and increased pressure on food banks to fill the need.
