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aspects of our operations more difficult but our staff and agencies demonstrated flexibility and creativity to meet the increased need.

With the help of friends like you, we were able to:

- Secure greater amounts of food—including fresh produce for our mobile food pantry program. We have served as many as 500 families at a single drive-through distribution!
- Add truck routes throughout our entire 18-county service area as more and more families faced food insecurity.
- Temporarily increase our cold storage capacity to allow us to accept and store larger amounts of fresh and frozen foods. This resulted in greater amounts of nutritious food being distributed across our region.
- Prepare to address the next wave of need in eastern Illinois.

These times and circumstances have tested everyone, and I'm proud of how our Foodbank has risen to the challenges we face. A resounding thank you to our amazing staff, dedicated volunteers and to you, our generous and supportive donors who make everything we do possible!

As the holidays approach, we know that many of our neighbors will be turning to the Foodbank and our agency partners for help in greater numbers. I am confident that, with your continued support, we will be able to provide not just nourishing food, but hope as well.

The Faces of Hunger

Across eastern Illinois, COVID-19 has disrupted thousands of lives. Unemployment surged to new highs in 2020, and many small businesses have shuttered for good.

But our community is resilient. We will take care of one another today so that we can emerge even stronger tomorrow. It starts with alleviating hunger, together.

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Lewis sits at the edge of his trunk, next to the groceries he has just received. His face is masked and his glasses are tinted...but behind all this, you can still see that Lewis is bewildered.

"I never expected to be in this position," he says. "My wife and I had good jobs, good income—we were secure."

Then COVID-19 struck.

"Within a month, we needed help," Lewis says. "It can happen to anybody."

Lewis is one of thousands of our eastern Illinois neighbors whose life was turned upside-down by the pandemic. He and his wife were semiretired and enjoyed the part-time jobs that put food on their table and kept them in touch with their community. They even welcomed Lewis' brother into their home when he lost his job.

Then Lewis and his wife were let go, too.

In the past, we were the ones donating to the Foodbank. Within a month, we needed help. It can happen to anybody.

"Between the three of us, we lost five jobs due to the virus," Lewis shares. "And I've been turned down for unemployment because my work was seasonal."

The severity of their situation hit Lewis like a ton of bricks: For the first time in their lives, they couldn't afford something as essential as food anymore.

But thanks to friends like you, the Foodbank has been going strong helping to provide nourishing food for more than 51,000 food-insecure households during the pandemic. And we were ready to help Lewis, too.



Your support helps us organize safe drive-through food distributions in 18 counties.



Thank you for helping neighbors like Lewis, who never expected to face hunger.

"This food makes the little bit of money we do have coming in go a lot further," he says.

Lewis can pick up dry and frozen goods, along with fresh fruits and vegetables, at his local Foodbank partner agency's drive-through distribution. The safely prepacked boxes contain enough food to last at least a week.

"We get really creative with the pasta and potatoes—and it works!" Lewis says, with joy in his voice for the first time.



Our fleet of trucks traveled 180,000 miles last year, delivering food and picking up donated product.

We distributed food to more than

8,300 veterans.



659,000 pounds of

food, including 234,000 pounds of produce, were distributed to nearly 25,000 individuals and 6,000 children through 52 Foodmobiles held on Saturday mornings in rural and under served communities.



6,200 schoolchildren and their families were provided food through our

provided food through our School Food Pantry Program.

We recycled 38 tons of cardboard from our facility.



To combat weekend hunger, 58,000 backpacks full of food were distributed to students from our BackPack Program partners, Feeding Our Kids

and Food 4 Kids.

11.5 million pounds of food,

including 2.5 million pounds of produce, were distributed to our network of partner food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters and other feeding programs. That's 9.5 million meals for children, seniors and families facing hunger.

Mission Impact Award – Central Illinois Produce

Central Illinois Produce has teamed up with Eastern Illinois Foodbank to provide boxes of fresh produce to those in need. As part of the USDA's Farmers to Families Food Box Program, Central Illinois Produce assembles and delivers boxes to EIF, which are then distributed through drivethrough food distributions throughout eastern Illinois to those in need.
