### NEW RECORD SET FOR PROM BENEFIT!

On March 10, an empty ballroom at the Hilton Garden Inn was transformed into a casino straight from the Vegas strip, complete with a roulette wheel, blackjack, poker and craps tables. The adjacent ballroom was dressed in tall gold candelabras, dark florals, sleek black chiavari chairs and, of course, a disco ball in the center of the dance floor. Guests arrived around 7pm and, thanks to our Prom Court, the evening started off with a bang!

Our Prom Committee assembled an outstanding Prom Court which included members from across our community. Our Prom Court is tasked to raise funds for votes (\$1 = 1\$ vote) and the male and female candidate that raises the most money for the Eastern Illinois Foodbank is crowned the night of the event.

To celebrate the decade long event, we brought back a past Prom Benefit King and Queen. Stefanie Pratt was crowned the 2013 Prom Queen and Brian Stark was the reigning King from 2017. This year's Prom Court truly made an incredible impact, raising \$75,000 in the months leading up to Prom – doubling last year's court total and raising 60% of our goal before the event even started.

Guests played casino games for raffle tickets and participated in a silent auction and paddle raise. Thanks to our sponsors, generous community and competitive Prom Court, our goal of raising 600,000 meals was blown away. **By the end of the night, over 711,800 meals (\$142,300+) were raised for our neighbors in need** and Brian Stark and Miranda Soucie were crowed Michelle's Bridal Prom King & Queen, raising more than 136,000 meals (\$27,000+) combined. The Prom Court and our community set a new standard for this event for years to come.









#### The best part is that the giving didn't stop after Prom was over...

Not only did 2018 Prom Queen, Miranda Soucie's, law firm (Spiros Law, P.C.) support her efforts in running for Prom Queen, they were also inspired to volunteer at the Foodbank! They have helped label hundreds of cans of carrots and repacked a thousand pounds of cereal. When asked what made her firm decide to support EIF outside of the Prom Benefit she explained:



"As we were talking about the Prom Benefit, and the food bank itself, I personally thought that fundraising was not enough. It is important, and the competition was fun, but at the end of the day, Prom is not what EIF is about. As a result, I wanted to follow through on the commitment to EIF and help the money that we raised actually become something tangible and useful to our community. When we asked our staff if they would be interested in helping out, they stepped up big. We have helped with repacking twice now, and I can promise, we will be back."

### DIRECTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends and supporters,

In the food industry one often hears about locally sourced products—something grown in a community that stays in the community. It usually refers to food or agriculture products, and local sourcing is valued as a sustainable practice. At EIF we benefit from an additional type of local sourcing--volunteers.

In each of the 18 counties we serve, we rely on local volunteers. People who live in the county who want to help their neighbors. On a rainy Saturday in March, 40 volunteers gathered at the American Legion Hall in Clinton to assist with a foodmobile. They set up tables, unpacked boxes, arranged produce, hung signs, and answered questions. One group even helped clients load groceries into their cars.

The group I am referring to was a team of smiling, enthusiastic young women wearing softball jerseys. When the Clinton High School Lady Maroon's softball game was canceled that morning, the team headed straight to the American Legion Hall to see how they could help. In addition to carrying their neighbor's groceries in the rain, they infused the group with energy and enthusiasm.

On this cold gray morning, these young women offered service with a smile. As one of them said, "It feels nice to do something for the community—to see some good in the world." Our volunteers make their communities brighter. They are a critical local resource in our fight against hunger.

Last year, volunteers contributed 9,260 hours to EIF. That is the equivalent of 4.5 full-time employees imbedded in local neighborhoods, providing support at our local facility. People in Clinton helping people in Clinton. Neighbors helping neighbors. We are privileged to be a part of this locally sourced, sustainable network of support.

## MEET EIF BOARD MEMBER: WENDY HARRIS

During the day she's the Assistant Dean for Administration for the School of Social Work at the University of Illinois, but after work hours she serves as a Foodmobile Captain and EIF's Board Chair. It all started when Wendy Harris was looking for a new volunteer opportunity in the social justice area, specifically a volunteer opportunity that allowed her to help on evenings and weekends. She reached out to EIF when we were in need of Foodmobile Captains (volunteers trained by EIF to manage Foodmobile/mobile food distributions).

Working on Foodmobiles allowed Wendy to learn more about the individuals and families in our area who don't know where their next meal will come from. She heard personal stories from those struggling to make ends meet, firsthand experiences of what "asking for help" feels like and statements of appreciation for what EIF and our network of agencies and programs provide. Wendy recalls, "I distinctly remember the appreciations of a grandmother having to feed her grandkids over spring break, helping someone who lived in her car and was limited on the types of food she could take, and a lesson from a client in all the ways you can use large quantities of tomatoes. And then there are the hugs of thanks!" It soon became clear that her next step was to join the Foodbank's Board of Directors.

She has been serving our board for the past 6 years, supporting our Foodmobile Program, attending events like our Prom Benefit with friends and family, and utilizing her expertise to guide the Foodbank's work in 18 counties across eastern Illinois.

ElF is the gateway to feeding our communities, where I out of 7 people struggle with hunger. By buying in bulk, repacking with the help of volunteers, and establishing connections with local businesses, ElF can provide our 220 local agencies with food to distribute. So much good can be done with every dollar or hour of time you donate!

## FOODMOBILES & VOLUNTEER NEEDS

We're often contacted by community groups, businesses and individuals in our community interested in volunteering. We're always delighted when a group asks, "What do you need help with most?"

We largely repack bulk food from our warehouse but repacking product isn't all we do. In fact, we have a large need for Foodmobile volunteers. Foodmobiles are mobile food pantries which are designed to provide emergency food to rural or under-served communities. Foodmobiles are generally held outside Champaign-Urbana on Saturday mornings and volunteers are needed from 8:45am until noon.

**Last year, EIF held 51 Foodmobiles which fed 15,000 individuals, including 6,000 children.** For many, Foodmobiles stretch budgets and help bridge the gap until the next paycheck or source of income arrives. These distributions wouldn't be able to take place without the help of volunteers.

We're currently in need of volunteers in McLean, Moultrie, Piatt, and Vermilion counties. Approximately 30 volunteers are needed for each distribution however, if you are a group coordinator and are interested in helping, your group is not required to fill all 30 spots.
